Birte Siim is a professor of gender studies at Aalborg University in Denmark. As a researcher of comparative welfare, she analyses European gender, class and citizenship regimes. Moreover, she has led various European Union research programmes and is active in the ECPR Standing Group on Gender and Politics. Her research projects include “Transformation of the Power of Gender – Similarity and Diversity in a Modern Welfare Society.”
